CENTRE MANAGERS REPORT

It brings me so much joy to hear from a student that our CUC has had a positive impact on their studies. Seeing them overcome challenges and complete their studies is both rewarding and truly inspiring!

It has been both a challenge and a delight to lead at the helm of CUC Cape York in its first full year of providing services to our local student population. The first semester of 2024 saw us reach unexpected heights with 86 student registrations. This is almost double our projected student numbers for our second year of operation. It is the ongoing support and enthusiasm of our beautiful community and emerging partnerships that has seen the CUC exceed these expectations and I thank everyone who has supported us during this time.

The end of 2023 and start of 2024 was not without its challenges for our centre, our staff and our students when cyclone Jasper delivered record breaking rainfall to our region. This caused a natural disaster which produced unprecedented flooding. Many homes and businesses were damaged as a result of this including the CUC and the homes of our students and staff. While it was one of the most difficult times our region has faced, the support of local people, emergency services, Council and the State and Federal Governments has seen our communities bounce back with ongoing infrastructure repairs as well economic and social supports.

We welcomed our Student Support and Outreach Coordinator, Kerry Clough to the team during this challenging time and I commend her for her willingness to assist with tasks outside of her role including helping with businesses and individuals who had been affected by the floods.



Part of Kerry's role has been to design and implement the Cape Country Careers program which is funded by the Australian Government Department of Education under the Regional Partnerships Project Pool Program (RPPPP). This widening participation program provides activities that stimulate engagement with education and provides information and guidance for community members of the Cape York Peninsula to investigate and participate in further education. We look forward to delivering this program throughout the region during 2024–25.



OUR STORY

The Country Universities Centre's origins were in the establishment of the Cooma Universities Centre in 2013, designed to provide improved supported higher educational opportunities in that town of approximately 7,000 people.

Students can connect with like-minded people and engage in a learning community while they study locally. We are focused on supporting the academic success of students and ensuring they have the tools to succeed in their higher education journey.

University of Technology Sydney (UTS)

UTS have partnered with the CUC to develop the Regional Partnerships Project Pool Program (RPPPP). This program brings together 19 universities and 16 Regional University Centres to design tailored school outreach programmes for the local community.

James Cook University (JCU)

JCU have partnered with CUC Cape York to deliver the RPPPP program throughout Cape York Peninsula, supporting outreach in remote communities through our Widening Participation Program, Cape Country Careers.

Central Queensland University (CQU)

CQU have partnered with CUC Cape York to deliver the RPPPP program throughout Cape York Peninsula, supporting outreach in remote communities through our Widening Participation Program, Cape Country Careers.

University of Queensland (UQ)

UQ have partnered with CUC Cape York to deliver the RPPPP program throughout Cape York Peninsula, supporting outreach in remote communities through our Widening Participation Program, Cape Country Careers, particularly in the areas of training and development as well as evaluation of the program.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



OUR COMMUNITY ARE OUR BIGGEST SUPPORTERS.

The Centre has engaged with local industry, schools, and organisations. The success of this Centre depends on the support from our local community.

Community Engagement

Our Centre has hosted a number of community engagement events and activities including a morning tea for the 60's and Better program, hosting the Cook Shire Youth Council meetings and providing a space for Mental Health First Aid training.

Staff have participated in events including NAIDOC and the Cooktown Discovery Festival as well as attending community meetings, events and markets in Cook Shire, Hope Vale and Wujal Wujal.

School Engagement

School engagement is increasing with the launch of the RPPPP program and has included visits from high schools in the Cooktown area to the CUC for both students and teachers. Staff have also attended Careers Expos in both Cooktown and Weipa and Year 12 graduation ceremonies at Cooktown high schools.

Students from Year 10 and up are able to access the Centre to support their studies with under 18's able to use the Centre while it is supervised between 8am and 5pm. This includes students who are accessing distance education.

Industry Engagement

During the start of 2024 CUC Cape York recognised the need to support local small businesses to complete grant applications for disaster relief assistance. This led to a new partnership with the Department of Employment, Small Business and Training (DESBT) and enabled many small businesses to access support from DESBT at the CUC during regular pop-up visits. The Centre was also utilised for local government training as new Councilors were welcomed to the region.

STUDENT SUPPORT

HERE FOR OUR STUDENTS

With the support of their local CUC regional, rural and remote students can follow their dreams when it comes to study. The CUC has responded to student needs and created an innovative model that allows choice by supporting any student, studying any course, at any Australian Tertiary Education Provider.

The wrap-around model of student support provides face-to-face academic, wellbeing, technology and administrative support in a learning community, in addition to what each student's learning institution already provides. These extra layers of support are crucial for many students who study with the CUC.

Regional online students are often at greater risk of attrition. Many students are from low Socioeconomic Status (SES) backgrounds, are the first in their family to attend university, or have caring responsibilities and multiple other commitments. The CUC offers a free, safe and welcoming environment to study with flexible and personalised, face-to-face support. The CUC understands that students are individuals and provides supports accordingly so that we meet students where they are in their education journey.

CUC Cape York exemplifies this model by deeply engaging with the communities of the Cape York Peninsula. Their tailored support and community-driven initiatives have significantly improved educational outcomes, providing a nurturing environment for students to thrive.





I'm currently studying Anthropology - I chose this degree mainly because I find humans and the culture that shapes us incredibly fascinating. I later chose to major in Indigenous Australian Studies as I've found it to be one of the most holistic, sustainable as well as oldest cultures in history. I believe we all have a lot to learn from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander practices particularly in the way we interact and connect with country.

There are many challenges in studying remotely including: access to reliable service, regular and long-lasting power and internet outages (Bloomfield), access to facilities and kms travelled in doing so (130km round trip), general higher cost of living, access to basic healthcare etc. creates a more challenging environment for students, across the board rules and protocols within University's that do not consider those students living remotely (e.g. inability to download lectures whilst access to internet is feasible rather having to watch them at specific times which means I am often sleeping in my car (once or twice a week) at the closest township Cooktown in order to complete these tasks).

If there's anyone out there considering study, I would urge you to give it a go! Sometimes the idea of studying or getting degree can be daunting – but instead of looking at the final goal or product aka getting the degree in order to further your career, why don't you just look at it as studying to keep your mind active, learn new and interesting things, more character building than anything! I believe the commercialisation of education has in many ways taken away from the essence of it. We do not need to study only to get a job, we can just study to learn.

The CUC is a great asset to the community because it provides support to those considering and/or participating in study, something that can be considerably daunting at the best of times, remote or not. So, we are very lucky to have a centre like this in Cooktown.
